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#### **NEWS ROUNDUP**

#### **New Website for Wickham Market**

A project to create a new website for Wickham Market is well underway supported by funding from East Suffolk Council and Suffolk County Council. The new site will support news, directories of businesses and activities together with facilitating parish organisations with their pages. The Parish Council are working closely with Wickham Market Partnership to deliver the best possible solution for both residents and visitors. We hope to be live in late Spring 2025.



**ALLOTMENT** bills and tenancy agreements have been renewed for 2025 which has resulted in a handful of allotments being offered to people on the waiting list which is managed by WM Allotments Association. Everyone is looking forward to a productive year!

**LITTER** has been a continuous issue around the village and the Parish Council values the dedicated volunteers who go out periodically to keep our village tidy. To support this activity the Parish Council has employed a part time litter picker to regularly check key areas in the village such as the playing field, children's play area and Little Lane.

**GRASS CUTTING** during the growing season is being done on a weekly basis for both the Village Hall and Simons Cross playing fields. This should improve the quality of the surface for all to enjoy.

**CEMETERY** improvements are taking place to create a calm and tidy area with sustainable ongoing maintenance costs. The first phase is to level graves older than 6 months to allow grass cutting equipment to create a tidy mown surface for all to enjoy. This is supported by our cemetery regulations which aim to provide a lawn cemetery. Further improvements will be assessed during 2025.



**FLOOD RESILIENCE** is a hugely important topic at the moment which is being addresses by Suffolk County Council and the Environment Agency supported by Wickham Market Parish Council. Reports and actions are being developed and a summary of the position in Wickham Market can be found on page 23.

**EMERGENCY PLAN** Working Group has attended East Suffolk Council EP forums and involved specialists from the Joint Emergency Plan Unit (JEPU) at two of its meetings. The Working Group has also listed the following tasks it will carry out which include:

- Distribute information to all properties in the village including a pull out "Z" card produced by JEPU offering advice and contact details
- The village hall will be the designated Emergency Rest Centre
- Explore options for managing pets during an evacuation
- Ensure DBS checks for the Working Group members in order to supervise the running of the Rest Centre
- · Information cards published on the website

**VILLAGE HALL MODERNISATION** is moving forward but we are still in the early stages of using a concept design to apply for grants to support the project. See pages 8 and 9 for an outline of the stages of this project.

**CLIMATE CHANGE** is another important topic for consideration in the world today. Our Climate Change Working Group is kicking off the new year with a social interactive evening on 31 January, see the back page for more information.

# WILDLIFE CORNER

When you are tucking into your Christmas dinner, please spare a thought for our wildlife.

There might not be as many animals visible at this time of year, but with a little effort, you can make it an easier season for them.



#### Leave the leaves

An easy to way look after wildlife in winter is actually to do less with your garden than you normally might. Please avoid pruning berry or any fruit-bearing bushes or trees, as these provide important food for birds, insects and small mammals over the next few months.



Allow leaves, twigs and sticks to pile up under hedges or in borders. This can provide a cosy home for hedgehogs, toads and dormice to hibernate. The leaves will also shelter insects – which will become food for insects as the leaves decompose. These insects will in turn be food for birds and hedgehogs who will feast by picking at the leaves. Watch out for any sleepy hedgehogs; they

might need help. Remember, 'out in the day is not ok'. If you do need to move piles of leaves or wood, especially to light a bonfire, make sure you check for small mammals first.

#### **Finding food**

The winter months are really hard for animals that don't hibernate at all, such as birds, squirrels, badgers and foxes. They need to keep their body temperature up by eating sufficient food, but it is so scarce at this time of year. You can be their lifeline by giving them supplementary food, i.e eggs for foxes, kitten biscuits for hedgehogs, (no milk please as they're lactose intolerant.

#### Don't forget the water

It's so important to supply wildlife with water, especially in freezing temperatures. A plant saucer with a few differently-sized stones in it will allow a variety of birds to bathe. If you place the saucer at ground level, many other animals will also be able to drink from it. Make sure you break the ice if it freezes.

If you have a pond, and the surface is frozen, you may want to melt or break some of the ice to allow animals to drink from it. Melt the ice by placing a hot saucepan on the surface, or gently poking a few holes. Avoid breaking the ice with any force, or by pouring boiling water in, as this could harm any fish, frogs or newts living inside.


Come and follow the star to celebrate Jesus' birth with us, the real "reason for the season".

#### VILLAGE HALL MODERNISATION

#### The Re-Development Process Explained

This article aims to communicate the modernisation process that we are currently engaged with and the various stages that we need to go through to deliver the new hall on behalf of the residents of Wickham Market. It is not intended to be an exhaustive description but rather describe an over-view.

There are four distinct stages to the modernisation:

#### **Concept Design**

Many of you will have seen the Concept Design drawings which have been produced by the architect. These initial drawings convey the potential layout of the hall, making most use of the space, the existing structure and directional aspects of the building. The purpose of these drawings is to attract funding for the project and communicate to village residents how the building space could be better utilised.

These drawings are NOT the final design and are not designed to display how the internal space will be fitted out. More detailed plans will be developed once the funds for the project are in place. These plans will be used for any planning application that we require. At the time of publication this is where we are in the process.

#### **Fund Raising**

Through the hard work of the team, we have been successful in securing £500K of funding from East Suffolk Council. Together with funds already ringfenced for modernisation we currently have half of the total funds required to deliver the project. The Joint Modernisation Working Group is currently engaged in

identifying and applying for funding from various appropriate organisations. We were unsuccessful with our grant application for funds from the National Lottery however we are currently awaiting to hear whether we have been successful in securing Sizewell C Community Funding.

A lot of work has been conducted to ascertain quotes for the various aspects of the work required to modernise the hall. These have been used to arrive at a total cost for the project.

To be clear, if we do not secure the required funding, the modernisation of the hall cannot move forward.

#### **Project Goes Live**

Once we have secured the required funding, we will be able to initiate the main phase of the project. We will procure contracts for the detailed design and modernisation of the hall. The detailed plans will be shared with the community and used for any planning applications that are required.

It is at this point that we will have to close the hall to users for 12-15 months to allow the hall to be stripped out ready for re-development.

We will make every effort to ensure the speedy completion of the modernisation, minimising the amount of disruption caused and the time that the hall is closed to users.

#### **Fitting out the Hall**

Once the structural aspects of the hall have been constructed and the services (electricity, water etc) installed we will turn our attention to the fit-out of the hall ready for users to return. This will include the kitchen, meeting rooms, toilets as well as the main hall area. Every effort will be made to accommodate the community's wishes and preferences within budgetary and design constraints.

Once this phase of work is completed, we will be able to re-open the hall and welcome existing and new users of the hall. It must be remembered that the hall will be very different to its current layout and finish. It will be more flexible, accessible, welcoming and an energy efficient community asset for us all to be proud of, use and enjoy.

Wickham Market residents deserve a modern Village Hall fit for the future.

# £5000 PROPERTY FLOOD RESILIENCE SCHEME

If your property was internally flooded between 19 - 25 October 2023, you might be eligible for a DEFRA grant of up to £5000 to make it more flood-resilient.

Property Flood Resilience (PFR) means that a property can better withstand floodwaters and be restored to its original condition more quickly after a flood event.

## What sort of thing could I use the PFR grant for?

- Flood resilient flooring Sealing external walls
- Waterproof plaster Flood doors or barriers
- Non-return valves on sewage systems
- Pumps to take away flood water
- Raising sockets above possible future flood levels.

#### What do I need to do next?

- Obtain a survey from a suitably qualified building surveyor
- Get independent quotes for the work
- Search "Suffolk PFR" to apply

# DEBEN PROBUS REVISITS A FASCINATING VIEW INTO SUFFOLK'S PAST

Deben Probus club, was formed in 1985 to encourage social interaction, fellowship and fun amongst retired professional and business people. We meet monthly in the Ufford Park Hotel for lunch followed by a talk on wide variety of subjects. We also have a very active walking group and from time to time organise group visits to local businesses and places of interest. We are always on the look out for new members and welcome anyone in this local area who would like to join. See below for contact details of our Secretary John Hickling.

On Tuesday 22 October this year we visited the Bentwaters airfield and "The Power of the Past" Museum collection. We were guided round first the museum and later the airfield in a bus driven by originator and owner of the enterprise Bill Kemball. The museum is set out in a number of different buildings which are full of tractors and agricultural machinery as well some WWII military hardware, World War I memorabilia, ladies fashions through the ages and rural life and implements. Outside the buildings is an array ploughs and varied other agricultural implements spread out.

Bill was an excellent guide and his commentary really gave life to this fascinating look at Suffolk life in past years, whilst guide Annette was equally informative about the clothing and domestic aspects of the collection.

Many of these machines are still in working order and we were treated to startups of two tractors and later of an early combine harvester after 85 year old Bill had hopped onto the driving area like a two year old to get it started. There followed the tour of the airfield, again with a commentary on the facilities that there are there. We saw amongst other things a vegetable cleaning and grading facility, a green electricity production unit from waste vegetables which powers much of the site, former bunkers for nuclear weapons now housing classic cars and a back up HQ building formerly for use in dire emergency now used to house the many film crews who regularly film on site. There is considerable wild life present too and we saw two herds of semi wild fallow deer that roam around within the secure perimeter fence. This was a memorable location and visit that can be recommended as a place to anyone interested in history of Suffolk.

#### FLOOD RESILIENCE FOR WICKHAM MARKET

Storm Babet caused significant disruption to communities across Suffolk between 18th and 21st October 2023. Wickham Market was one of the most severely impacted locations. Over 40 residential and commercial properties were internally flooded, and infrastructure and services disrupted. Suffolk County Council (SCC) as Lead Local Flood Authority, has therefore undertaken a Section 19 Flood Investigation. The resulting report will:

- Highlight the probable causes of flooding.
- Identify options to reduce future flood risk and increase property resilience.
- Make recommendations for actions by relevant responsible organisations, landowners or homeowners.

In June 2024 the parish council Vice-Chairman and a local resident who helped residents on the night of the storm, met with SCC, the Environment Agency (EA) and our District Councillor to assess what happened on the night, which properties were affected by the flood water and what other local knowledge would assist SCC in preparing a report.

In August 2024 SCC published its report. This can be found on the SCC web site at wickham-market-s19-flood-investigation-2024-08-28. The report identifies 4 areas of the village that suffered the most from the storm. The report has taken into account site visits, anecdotal evidence from residents and businesses and topographical and flooding maps of the area.

In its summary the report identifies work carried out to date which includes:

- The EA and SCC Highways planning to de-silt the River Deben under Rackham's bridge in Autumn 2024 – this was attempted and deferred but may still happen before the end of the year
- EA has started to improve its hydraulic modelling with data from the storm
- Residents and landowners alongside the River Deben have been asked to remove debris in the river
- The primary school are carrying out investigations of their drains
- SCC are investigating ownership of the piped watercourse beside the tennis courts

The report then recommends future actions in the short, medium and longer term to be actioned by the EA, landowners, Highways, SCC and residents. There is an expectation that Wickham Market Parish Council will include the risk of flooding in its Emergency Plan and that has been done.

In assessing the report the Vice-Chairman submitted several comments and queries to SCC. Of particular note were:

- Who is going to contact residents asking them investigate "rainwater collection systems"? What type of systems are these and who would fund these?
- What are "Natural Flood Management" options? We assume these could be ditches
  or new ponds. Where would they be located? Who would fund these?

There are grants of up to £5,000 that are available to residents of flooded properties funded from the Governments Flood Recovery Framework to help flooded property owners make their homes and businesses more resilient to future flooding. Advisory postcards were produced by the EA, some of which were distributed and some deposited in the village library. It has been a busy Autumn term of learning and extracurricular enrichment here at Wickham Market Primary School. Each class hosts two Curiosity Cafés per year

Children in Reception and Nursery visited Ipswich East Fire Station. They listened to the firefighter as he told them how important it is to have smoke detector in our home, what number we should call if we notice a fire and they also learnt about the special equipment firefighters need to wear and carry. The children were particularly excited to test out the hose and sit up high in the engine!



Where appropriate we link our trips to learning in lessons. Year 3/4 and Year 4/5 both enjoyed trips linked to their history work. Year 4/5 visited Kentwell Hall, stepping back in time to become Tudors for the day and Year 3/4 enjoyed an engaging Egyptian workshop kindly hosted by Brandeston Hall.

Children have also had the opportunity to take part in a range of supporting events. The highlight being thirty of our key stage two children taking part in a cross-country competition. As well as fantastic running, it was wonderful to see the children demonstrate such great sportsmanship, cheering everyone on at the finish line and congratulating team mates when they finished, as well as amazing resilience, having a go and finishing the race even when they felt nervous or tired!

At this time of year many parents of nursery age children are busy making the decision as to which primary school they would like to apply for their child to attend in September 2025. It has been a pleasure to personally show round many prospective families over the last few weeks. There is still time to book a tour of your own before applications have to be in on 15th January 2025. Wishing you a Merry Christmas

The 'Shedders' meet in the two portacabins and shed (which were

fully rewired by local firm, Hudsons Electrical, who provided their time for free) and now has a functioning workshop. They are sited behind the Village Hall and Football Club, in agreement with Wickham Market Parish Council.

The Shed movement began in Australia in 1999 and has since extended to the UK. Men's Sheds (or Sheds) are like garden sheds – a place to pursue practical interests at leisure, to practice skills and enjoy making and mending. The difference is that garden sheds and their activities are often solitary in nature while Men's Sheds are the very opposite. They are about social connections and friendship building, sharing skills and knowledge, and of course a lot of laughter. The Shed isn't a repair shop as such but a space for 'Shedders' to work on communal or personal projects.

The importance of Sheds for men's health is not to be underestimated; having a common goal, working side by side makes a positive difference, with time to chat.



# The Woodbridge Reporter and Wicksam Market Gazette.

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No. 1 830 (months) at the country

THURSDAY, APRIL 26, 1894.

ONE PENNY.

In the previous edition, I said that in later articles we would learn about the other "lost" pubs of Wickham Market. However, we have recently discovered some articles published in the Woodbridge Reporter and Wickham Market Gazette (yes, there was such a newspaper) in 1894. Unfortunately we don't know who wrote them, but there was a series entitled "Wickham Market Past and Present", and I thought it would be interesting to see how they described The Vine and The Crown, which we heard about last time.

If there is one thing that an honest thinking Englishman dislike it is a monopoly, or in other words that a few should fatten and grow rich on the spendings of others, with no chance of such a state of things being remedied. In no branch of the industry, if we may use the term, has this been more apparent during the last half of the century than in connection with the brewing interests. Take the whole country through and we have the same results, house added to house until it has become a great monopoly, and that which was formerly in the hands of the many is now in the hands of the few, and those few are growing rich and amassing vast fortunes out of the people's earnings. And in a great many instances it is not the publican but the Brewer who is growing rich, and as the result their power and influence is felt in our political as well as our social life. And so closely allied are the great brewing interests with the church as by law established that the two are powerful factors in our village life, and only by hard and continued struggles on the part of the people has liberty been won and civil rights obtained.

Sixty years ago, in Wickham Market there was only one tied public house in the place, today there are five, thus showing on a small scale how this monopoly has increased. It is not so much our province in this article to deliver a homily to the publicans, as it is to notice the public houses and those who have occupied them. Sixty years ago, Bruce's Act was not known, and it was within the law to keep open day and night, Sundays excepted, but a restriction has been put on this, and we can but think wisely, both in the interests of the public and the publicans. Beginning at the South end of the place we notice first the house now known as the Vine Inn. This was formerly the Grapes Inn. It is a somewhat modern house as a public-house; before being a fully licenced house, parts of the premises were used as wine vaults by Mr Robert Minter, who then lived in the house now occupied by Mr William Turtill.

When the house was fully licenced, it was taken by Mr. Lewis Garrett with a fine array of gilt tubes, but like all the empty things they made the most noise. For a time a good amount of business was done. He was followed by Mr George Ling, (now of Great Gelham), a lively man in his time. The house was the resort of gentlemen's servants, and many a quiet party was held lasting into the small hours of the morning. Mr Ling was succeeded by his father-in-law Mr Robert Barnes, of Woodbridge, who at one time held the position of Sheriff's Officer. Part of the house was utilised as a butcher's shop, Gocher of Ipswich, being then in the height of his fame as a cheap butcher, and for a time beef and mutton could be had cheap, but after a while this passed away and the

house was taken by Mr William Jackson, and underwent extensive alterations and put on a more respectable appearance, and was the resort of the tradesmen and some commercial travellers. Since that time it has passed through various hands, its present occupier is Mr Thacker. Its fortunes have been varied but probably very few fortunes have been made at the house. The Crown Inn is no doubt the oldest hostelry in the place and at one time was the principal one, its styled denoted its antiquity. It is a somewhat remarkable fact that formerly many public houses were built near a church, this probably give rise to the old couplet:

Where God has placed a house of prayer, The devil builds his temple there.

Near the end of the house close by the Church gates formerly stood the parish stocks, into which offenders were put to be the gazing-stock of the public and as a penalty for their evil doings. In the early part of the last century all roads measured from Wickham Market were measured from the Crown Inn, and which undoubtedly was then the principal house in the place. It has been long being the property of the Cobbold family and was the only tied house in the place at the time already referred to. In the early part of the present century, it was kept by Simon Hurran who afterwards resided in a small cottage in the road leading to the White Hart yard. Simon in his old days was a postman. Jeremiah Woods followed Hurren at the Crown and remained there for a number of years.

The house during the greater part of his tenancy was noted for its cleanliness and was one of the best kept houses in the place. Mrs Woods would sit in the kitchen with her customers and woe be to the man that misbehaved himself or made a mess, everything was scrupulously clean. This was a house where the newspaper was read aloud, oftentimes by John Barker and listened to by the customers. Here for some years was carried on the kind of free and easy to which the members contributed one penny per week, and on the St Stephen's day had their annual dinner and jollification. These were the days of egg flip, and speech and song was the order of the day, and for the matter of that night too. The latter part of Mr Woods's tenancy the house went down and lost much of its good name. Jerry Woods at intervals had a habit of lying in bed for days and weeks at a time; he might well have been termed "the sleeping beauty". The result was that while the cat's away the mice will play, the business went on from bad to worse till he left the house and lived in a cottage at Ufford where he died a few years since. The tenpin ground at his house was a noted place, and where old Will Olding better known as "Wop-em-up" was often found with kindred spirits. This "Wop-em-Up" was noted for two things --- a proficiency in tenpin playing, and for singing the Wonderful Crocodile. Since Woods's time the house has passed through several hands but has never regained the position it once occupied. Its present occupier is Mr. John Nickels.
