SIZEWELL C TRAFFIC CALMING MEASURES FOR WICKHAM MARKET




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
The Christmas Market held on The Hill at Wickham Market on Saturday 30th November was a hit with stallholders and visitors alike.

ALL CHANGE AT WICKHAM MARKET POST OFFICE AND STORES!

On Tuesday 7th January the village community said an appreciative farewell to Nicola and Anthony who had run the Post Office in Wickham Market for seven years.

Off to pastures new, they were overwhelmed by the warm send off they received. On behalf of the village, Wickham Market Parish Council presented the couple with a bouquet and a thank you card in recognition of the couple's kindness and good works.



As Nicola and Anthony had their possessions loaded into the removal lorry we welcomed the new owners of the Post Office and Stores, business partners, Chandu and Maddy. Chandu commented, "Whilst we have plenty of business experience, this is our first joint venture. With our team, Vasanth, Ravi and Hasini we have been learning the intricacies of running a Post Office, just as Nicola and Anthony did when they arrived."

The store has extended its opening hours which are now 8am to 8pm, Monday to Sunday and they can also sell stamps, take cash in and pay cash out as well as provide vehicle tax. The full range of Post Office services is available 9am until 5pm, Monday to Friday and 9am until 1pm on Saturdays.

Chandu and Maddy are planning a Premier Store refit in the spring to bring a wide range of affordable products into the shop. Maddy said, "With good parking and longer opening hours we look forward to welcoming the community as well as providing them with a high level of service."

VILLAGE HALL MODERNISATION

Sizewell C Community Foundation Grant Application

Village Hall Modernisation grant application of £600k was issued to Sizewell C Community Foundation early October 2024 with all supporting information and documentation

We received notification from Sizewell C Community Foundation on 17th December 2024 that the Independent Awards Panel had met and considered our application for this round of funding and provided feed-back in relation to their decision. The Panel felt that more detail was needed before a final decision could be made on our application

Modernisation Working Group will review the Independent Awards Panels comments and feedback thoroughly and re-submit the additional information requested to meet the suggested review panel date of 20th April 2025.

One of the Awards Panel's recommendations was that we contact (CAS) Community Action Suffolk who could provide technical support with our grant application as at the date of this report we have contacted CAS and await confirmation of arranging a meeting date.

A further recommendation was that the Review Panel would like to see further scrutiny of the project plans and costings and we therefore have contacted a (QS) Quantity Survey who could provide more accurate cost plans to support the project's budget prices previously submitted with our grant application. We await the QS cost for this element of work.

Our current position is that by NOT receiving Grant Funding from Sizewell C Community Foundation at this round of funding the modernisation project is still far short of funds needed to commence major works on the Village Hall Modernisation Project as we previously hoped this would commence Spring of 2025.

The Modernisation Working Group continue to explore every opportunity of

grant funding with support from ESC Councillor Sally Noble, Communities Officer Sam Kenwood and Community Action Suffolk.

Modernisation Committee Terms of Reference has been agreed by the Parish Council at their meeting on 20th January 2025. User Groups were updated on the Village Hall Modernisation Plans at the last Village Hall CIO meeting held on Friday 6th December 2024. Village Hall parking remains an issue for those attending functions with people not attending village hall functions using the playing field as an unauthorised overspill parking area causing damage to the playing field.

DO YOU HAVE A SPARE ROOM THAT COULD BE MAKING YOU MONEY?

Sizewell Housing grants could be the key to you making that space work for you

The Construction of Sizewell C will bring workers into the area who will be looking for accommodation around Sizewell and that includes Wickham Market. If you own your property and have a spare room, annexe, garage or property that could make safe and comfortable living space for a Sizewell C worker you may be eligible for a grant to assist towards getting the room/property up to a lettable standard. All grants are subject to you obtaining the necessary Planning and Building Regulations approvals.

Minor Works Grants

Minor Works Grants of up to £3,000 per bedspace are available to bring an unused bedroom into use within an existing home to be accommodated by a Sizewell C worker. All works must be carried out by a suitable trades person as DIY applications will not be considered. The accommodation must be made available to use for 5 years from the date of completion otherwise the grant is subject to repayment in full. Conditions will be linked to the property via a deed of agreement lodged as a local land charge.

Renovation Grants

Renovation grants of up to a maximum of £7,000 per bedspace are available to assist with the conversion of annexes, garages or non-residential buildings or conversion of existing homes into licensable standard HMOs (3 or more bedrooms) to provide safe & suitable residential accommodation for Sizewell C workers. Works must be carried out by a suitable trades person. DIY applications will not be considered. The grants will be subject to conditions which will be linked to the property via deed of agreement lodged as a local land charge. The Grant will be subject to repayment if the accommodation is not available for use for the first 10 years from the date of completion.

Energy Performance Certificate (EPC)

Where a current valid Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) is not in place we can help towards the cost of obtaining one. In addition to this up to a maximum of £2,500 can be applied for to carry out recommended works towards the property obtaining an EPC rating of C^*

*All available Government and OFGEM promoted grants must be applied for first, where available.

EAST SUFFOLK COUNCIL COMMUNITY SUPPORT

Sam Kenwood Communities Support Officer writes

There are lots of great things happening in the community and I along with local councillors including Cllr Sally Noble (East Suffolk Councillor for Wickham Market) try and support community work as much as possible.



Firstly, it might be helpful to know what a Communities Officer does. There are nine of us in East Suffolk covering different areas and I cover Wickham Market, Framlingham and Kelsale and Yoxford wards; this totals 40 parishes. We work with local councillors, health, Police, community and voluntary organisations, schools, youth services and others to support communities as best we can. This might be around community safety, local projects, health and wellbeing, cost of living or transport. It is all about supporting and enabling communities to meet needs in their local area.

For instance, let's briefly look at transport. As we know, this can be a difficult challenge for some within the community. There are community transport options available which is useful to be reminded about. These are listed below:

Connecting Communities

This can be booked where there is no regular bus available. It can pick you up from your village and take you to your nearest train station or in some cases, your final destination. Pop in a booking request of where you want to go and Coastal Accessible Transport Service (CATS) will get back to you with details and fare. It is always a pleasure to put together an article for the parish magazine as it prompts me to review and reflect upon all of the exciting things that have been happening at school over the last couple of months.



At the end of November, after weeks of rehearsing (including workshops led by singing specialists from Britten Pears Art) year 4 and 5 took part in the Big Sing event at Snape Maltings. They sang with enthusiasm alongside many other Suffolk schools, a great experience I am sure they will remember for many years to come.

Towards the end of the year our key stage one classes took part in some great trips to enhance their history work in the classroom. As part of Year 1's learning about the history of toys they visited the Red House in Aldeburgh, where they explored the life of Benjamin Britten, particularly his childhood and were able to try some of the toys he would have played with. Year 2 had been learning about the history of school and took a visit to Gressenhall Farm and workhouse. They spent the day dressed as Victorians and learnt about what life would have been like for children at the workhouse, experienced a Victorian schoolroom and made some treats to bring home.





The lead up to Christmas in school provides many opportunities for the children to develop their performance skills. Our school choir performed a selection of songs to entertain the public at the Wickham Market Christmas Market in the

square and also visited Wickham House to serenade the residents. Our nursery and reception children performed a traditional nativity play, while key stage one performed a slightly less traditional play of Christmas with the aliens.

We are very lucky to have our own onsite woodland and make the most of this facility by offering weekly Forest School sessions for pupils. Forest school provides many opportunities for learning across the curriculum, as well as developing the skills needed to work as a team and assess risk. This half-term is Year 6's turn, they have been exploring animal tracks and learning to use tools safely.





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FROM THE ARCHIVES: 14 APRIL 1699

This month we deviate from the previous series about Wickham Market's old pubs. **WARNING:** This article contains information that some people may find upsetting

What is the significance of 14th April 1699? Apart from being nearly 326 years ago, it was the date of the last known hanging in Wickham Market, and the last use of the gibbet at Potsford.

The gibbet post still remains, in the woods, but the sign in front of it has fallen into disrepair, so the Archive Centre has obtained a new sign, which will be fixed in time to "commemorate" the anniversary of this event. A new walk leaflet will also be launched at the same time, with a walk which will take in a visit to the gibbet.

The following extract from the Woodbridge Reporter and Wickham Market Gazette of 22nd March 1894, explains what happened:

"On the hill from time to time various scenes have been enacted. Near two centuries ago an execution took place. From an old record we quote the following: - "A man named Jonas Snell was hanged in Wickham Market street for the murder of John Bullard, his master, and John Bullard, his master's father, at Letheringham Mill [Note: father and son were both called John Bullard]. His body was afterwards hanged in chains upon Potsford's Hill by the road leading from Wickham Market to Letheringham". Tradition says that his skeleton hung in the wood many years, and birds built their nests in his skull.

The gibbet posts remained until recent years, and when the main road went by the spot, it was avoided at night by superstitious persons. In his confession as published by B. Smith, of Woodbridge, Snell says that he obtained leave from his master to visit his brother, but only proceeded as far as the Ufford Crown, where he drank one mug of beer. He then returned home and secretly entered the mill. Having ransacked his master's clothes for money in vain, he kept an eye on him to find where his money was secreted. Afterwards he took one of his master's bottles and went to Easton Street and bought a pint of clover water and some biscuits. He returned about midnight and found his master playing cards with neighbours. After they were gone, he says, "I went into the mill and took from thence a sledgehammer called a maul, and did strike him (the father) one blow on the right side of the head. I afterwards struck him (the son) on the hinder part of his head, and after that I struck both of them several times. I then took the door off its hinges and went towards my brother's and about three o'clock in the morning I got to Wickham and designing to cross the nearest way I wandered up and down until morning light, thinking I had been near Ipswich, when I was not above two or three miles from the place where the murder was done".

(This hammer is still used in Letheringham Mill and is known by the name of Jonas).

While in Bury gaol, Snell is said to have composed the following lines:

The father's grey and aged head, Received the leading blow; Then, as I was by Satan led, I struck the son also. Who straight arose and likewise cried. I had his father killed; And ere I could be satisfied. Their dearest blood I spilled. He staggered and could hardly stand, Having received a wound; Then with the hammer in my hand, I fell him to the ground. I gave him many cruel blows, Till they were murdered quite; Which done I packed up all their clothes, And so I took my flight. With bleeding heart and melting eyes, My crime I do bewail; Good God be pleased to hear my cries, Tho' in a loathsome gaol.



After Snell's execution, a sermon was preached in Dallinghoo Church by Thomas Smyth, an affectionate lover of souls, on "Good, charitable and well pleasing hopes of the Penitent Murder's Pardon and Salvation A.D. 1699."

After the hanging, Jonas Snell's body was dragged behind a cart down the steep Draggards Hill, to the gibbet. Today, this name has been changed, and people sometimes refer to it as Drag Arse Hill.

Snell's body hung on the gibbet in an iron cage for 40 years, as a deterrent, until his remains were buried at the base of the gibbet.

SUFFOLK'S SECRET ARMY THE 'SPECIAL DUTIES' BRANCH.

If the German invasion had occurred 1940, or thereabouts, it was recognised that although the Operational Patrols had gone underground into their underground Bases to disrupt enemy communications: destroy fuel and ammunition dumps and to harass the enemy in any way possible but not to damage the essential infrastructure of the country.

Bridges: rail and road links; canals and waterways: telephone lines and other lines of communications were to be left intact and in working order, as the Army counterattack would be much easier if it did not have to contend with blown bridges and destroyed roads.

About the same time as the Operational Patrols were formed, trained and their underground bases constructed, a second, but an entirely separate organisation was formed to operate above ground after the invasion had occurred, this was the 'Special Duties' branch.

The modus operandi of the 'Special Duties' branch was, despite operating 'behind the lines' in what was effectively territory occupied by enemy forces, was to supply information to a secret wireless station network situated underground within the occupied area, where civilian operators transmitted reports to an Army HQ outside the occupied area.

The 'Special Duty' operatives were essentially men and women who acted as 'spies' and had to go about their normal business daily and be capable of operating under enemy occupation; typically, they were postmen: midwives: doctors: vicars: farmers: shopkeepers and housewives. They had no uniform and if caught, would have been shot as spies.

Their primary task was to collect information about the enemy troops (with specific reference to the insignia the troops were wearing thereby identifying whether they were Wehrmacht or S.S.): estimating the numbers of enemy trucks and tanks in their 'area' and any other information that could be fed back to Army HQ outside the occupied area.

A report would be written up by a 'spy' and delivered to a concealed 'letter box' which could be a hollow in a tree: an empty can: a drainpipe etc.

The report would then be collected by a 'runner' and deliver the report to the secret wireless station run by civilians (trained by military intelligence) via a hidden entrance in the ground.

The report would then be transmitted to Army HQ outside the occupied area. The radio sets and batteries were initially concealed in boxes with detachable lids sunk into the ground and camouflaged; this method of concealment has its disadvantages as operators were open to discovery whilst transmitting reports to Army HQ.

Realising secrecy was of prime importance during enemy occupation all wireless stations went underground in purpose build underground bases stocked with rations: paraffin heaters etc.

The bases were usually concealed in woods, the entrance consisting of a flat platform supported on two metal tubes with pulleys and counterweights so that the platform was raised vertically by the release of a concealed catch, thus retaining its horizontal position together with the undergrowth which concealed it

The interior of the base consisted of a small room lined with storage racks from floor to ceiling which were stacked with items to give the impression that it was an underground storage depot for the Home Guard. One set of racks was a blind as on the release of a concealed lever, it could be swung open to reveal the entrance door to the transmitting room. The room was equipped with bunks, paraffin heater and Army K rations. In some bases there was a further room containing a motor generator for charging the batteries and an escape tunnel to allow the operatives a means of escape in the event of discovery by the enemy occupational forces.

If the invasion had occurred, it had been estimated that the life of a man in one of the Operational Patrols would have been three weeks; one wonders what the life expectancy of 'Special Duty' person would have been or those civilians operating the secret wireless stations....
